Y., alleging that the article had been shippe the California Seedless Raisin Co., from Oakland, Calif., between the dat March 29, 1927, and April 4, 1927, and transported from the State of Calif into the State of New York, and charging adulteration in violation of food and drugs act.

It was alleged in the libel that the article was adulterated, in that it sisted in whole or in part of a filthy, decomposed, or putrid vegetable subst On August 16, 1927, the California Seedless Raisin Co., Oakland, Calif., h appeared as claimant for the property, a decree was entered ordering tha
