6774. Adulteration and misbranding of butter. U. S. v. 23 Tubs of Butter. Consent decree of condemnation and forfeiture. Product released under bond. (F. & D. No. 24139. I. S. No. 021228. S. No. 2264.)

On August 29, 1929, the United States attorney for the Southern District of lew York, acting upon a report by the Secretary of Agriculture, filed in the listrict Court of the United States for said district a libel praying seizure and ondemnation of 23 tubs of butter, remaining in the original unbroken packages t New York, N. Y., alleging that the article had been shipped by the Northwest lairy Forwarding Co., from Duluth, Minn., on or about August 21, 1929, and cansported from the State of Minnesota into the State of New York, and harging adulteration and misbranding in violation of the food and drugs act. It was alleged in the libel that the article was adulterated in that a substance efficient in butterfat had been mixed and packed with it so as to reduce or over or injuriously affect its quality or strength, and had been substituted rholly or in part for the said article.

Misbranding was alleged for the reason that the article was offered for

ale under the distinctive name of another article.

On September 13, 1929, the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co., claimant, having dmitted the allegations of the libel and having consented to the entry of a ecree, judgment of condemnation and forfeiture was entered, and it was rdered by the court that the product be released to the said claimant upon ayment of costs and the execution of a bond in the sum of \$750, conditioned 1 part that it be reprocessed so that it contain at least 80 per cent of butterfat.

6775. Adulteration and misbranding of butter. U. S. v. 30 Tubs of Butter. Consent decree of condemnation and forfeiture. Product released under bond. (F. & D. No. 24146. I. S. No. 021250. S. No. 2304.)

On September 10, 1929, the United States attorney for the Southern District f New York, acting upon a report by the Secretary of Agriculture, filed in 12 District Court of the United States for said district a libel praying seizure 13 nd condemnation of 30 tubs of butter, remaining in the original unbroken ackages at New York, N. Y., alleging that the article had been shipped by 12 Parmers Cooperative Creamery (& Produce) Co., Grantsburg, Wis., on 13 r about August 31, 1929, and transported from the State of Wisconsin into 12 State of New York, and charging adulteration and misbranding in violation 13 f the food and drugs act.

It was alleged in the libel that the article was adulterated in that a substance efficient in butterfat had been mixed and packed with it so as to reduce or over or injuriously affect its quality or strength, and had been substituted

holly or in part for the said article.

Misbranding was alleged for the reason that the article was offered for

ale under the distinctive name of another article.

On September 18, 1929, the Farmers Cooperative Creamery & Produce Co., transburg, Wis., claimant, having admitted the allegations of the libel and aving consented to the entry of a decree, judgment of condemnation and orfeiture was entered, and it was ordered by the court that the product be eleased to the said claimant upon payment of costs and the execution of a ond in the sum of \$900, conditioned in part that it be reworked and reprocsed so that it contain at least 80 per cent of butterfat.
